Report of the Board of Trustees

For the year ending 31 March 2004

The Board of Trustees submit their report and the audited financial statement for the year ended 31" March 2004, which comply with current statutory requirements and with the company's memorandum and articles of association.

Principle Aims and Objectives

The principle objectives for which the charity is established are:

To preserve and promote the good health, and in particular the physical, sexual and mental health of:

- Persons who are Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual or Transgendered
- Persons in doubt of their sexual identity
- Persons diagnosed with HIV and related illnesses
- Any persons who may be affected or involved with any of the above, particularly partners and families

And to provide relief for such people in need thereof at times of mental and emotional stress.

Company Status

The Lesbian & Gay Foundation is a company limited by guarantee and all members have agreed to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 in the event of a winding-up. At 31° March 2004 the Company had 60 members.

Subisidary Companies

At 31 March 2004 the Lesbian & Gay Foundation operated two wholly owned subsidiaries both of which were dormant for the year ended 31 March 2004. These companies are Manchester Lesbian & Gay Switchboard Services Limited and the Lesbian & Gay Foundation Trading Company Limited.

Review of activities and achievements during the year

Chief Executive's Review

As we head towards the LGFs fifth anniversary, I have been reflecting on the significant achievements we have made during that time, some of which are highlighted in this Annual Report, and further details are available on our recently improved website www.lgf.org.uk. The key fact which has struck me again and again is just how much you can achieve when you work with the right people and you adopt a 'can do' attitude. The people of the LGF to a man and woman display these characteristics and again I'm reminded how priviledged I am to work with such talented, dedicated and motivated people.

I have also been thinking about the coming years and what they may hold for the LGF. Over the next 5 years there can be no doubts that the 'not for profit' sector will see a heightening of the challenges we have experienced in previous years;

- The need and demand for our services is growing ever greater,
- The people we serve have new needs, and often those needs are becoming more sophisticated
- Competition for securing funds and resources is growing
- Corporate governance, financial management and commercial effectiveness will be the new key determinants of our ongoing success.

In order to meet these challenges the LGF has been undergoing a cultural change programme recently in order to refocus, refine and expand our services. We have been reassessing our potential and by developing a new 'Strategic Framework' we are gearing ourselves up to a new and radical level of performance.

The LGFs 'Strategic Framework', which I promised we would develop in last years Annual Report, is a collective agreement on why we exist. Our Mission of 'Ending Homophobia, Empowering People' is what we are attempting to achieve together, as well as the ultimate result of our collective endeavours.

We have also identified a collective Vision for the LGF, a statement that explains how the LGF and we as the people of the LGF are going to measure our success. How by setting our sights high we are going to encourage ourselves and each other to achieve great things:

'We believe in a fair and equal society where all lesbian, gay and bisexual people can achieve their full potential'.

In order for us to achieve great things, we need to have an agreed way of working together. A set of values we all share as an organisation to guide us in performing and carrying out our duties. The Values we have chosen for the LGF are; Excellence - We will strive for excellence in all that we do. Fairness - We will strive to be fair and even-handed. Integrity - We will strive to be open and honest with each other as well as with others. Diversity - We will strive to be accepting and representative. Innovation - We will strive to be creative and - innovative in our solutions.

The final part of the jigsaw is to outline the activities we are going to carry out to accomplish our Mission of 'Ending Homophobia, Empowering People'. We have identified 5 Strategic Goals; Campaign - We will fight and lobby for change, Research - We will be needs led and evidence driven, Infrastructure - We will put people first and build a strong organisation, Support - We will deliver sustainable services and promote choice, Partnership - We will build unity and facilitate growth.

Each of these Strategic Goals has 2 Strategic Targets (making 10 in total) which are outlined below in small blue writing. All of the work the LGF carries out fits under one of these 'Strategic Targets'.

Our IMPACT in Brief

Through providing safer sex packs we enabled men to have safer sex **498,940** times last year throughout Greater Manchester

We informed and advised over **92,059** people through outnorthwest and a further **144,595** gained vital information on services and sexual and general health through our printed resources; aimed exclusively at Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual people

Through our Helpline and Administration lines **5150** people were supported and informed by phone

101 people in over **800** sessions were assisted to improve their mental health via the LGF's Face to Face counselling service.

Through the LGF's Group work programme; **214** people were able to explore coming out, meet others and gained vital support away from the commercial gay scene.

1412 members of the LGB community informed our work through their participation in the LGF's research questionnaires

Through our training programme we enabled **1339** people: become more accepting of diversity or become more aware of their sexual health and be more assertive

In a year of innovative work; we campaigned to reduce Hepatitis B infection; by vaccinating **65** Gay and Bisexual men outside a hospital setting for the first time in the North West.

With your help; through fundraising events, paid for services, our Supporters scheme and funding bids we raised an additional £1.20 for every £1 we received from our statutory funders.

With **2,279,946** hits to our website; we made a significant contribution to increasing access to information and services for LGBT people who were unable or chose not to visit us in person. And over **8,500** people liked us so much they came through our doors to seek our help, advice, support or to work in partnership with us.

OUR IMPACT

People often assume we only provide services for people in Manchester. 55% of our services and resources were used by people living or visiting North, South and Central Manchester. Last year; 45% of our face to face time and resources were delivered to residents of Stockport, Bury, Oldham, Heywood, Rochdale, Salford, Trafford, Wigan and Middleton, as well as the visitors to these areas. In addition; our Helpline website, outnorthwest and information resources were used by an increasing number of people from throughout the Northwest region and indeed beyond - cementing yet further the LGF's reputation as a truly regional Organisation.

Helping to strengthen our community

Last year the LGF offered support to many LGB groups and organisations in a wide variety of ways: We began working with Wisk in Wigan to help them develop their infrastructure. We provided vital space for community groups such as: The Triangle Club for Deaf and hearing impaired LGB people and D'Arcy Lainey Foundation – a support group for LGB parents. Albert Kennedy Trust and The Alzheimer's Society have both been able to base themselves within the Lesbian and Gay Community of Greater Manchester by taking space in Unity House.

We welcomed 29 new volunteers; who joined the LGF last year and who received inductions, training and support to help them get the most out of being part of our 100+ volunteer team.

Campaigning with you for change:

In July 2003, after 9 years of providing free, extra strong condoms, we consulted with you through the 'Condoms are Changing' campaign to switch to regular strength condoms; still keeping you safe but increasing your pleasure.

We delivered a campaign and helped co-ordinate the vigil to mark Holocaust Memorial Day, on 29th January 2003. And the LGF was one of the first organisations to celebrate the demise of Section 28; with a poster campaign and coverage in outnorthwest

Building Partnerships to meet need

Much of our work was made possible through partnerships with both the statutory and voluntary sectors; who demonstrated true commitment to the LGB Community.

With GMP Police we facilitated the Chief Constables meeting with the LGBT community at Unity House. LGF advised on and produced publicity for the 'Safe on the Canal' Campaign. By delivering diversity training we enabled Police probationers at Sedgley Park and Bootle Street; to be more aware in their work with LGBT citizens. Our partnership to promote Hate Crime Reporting entered a new phase with the Police agreeing to fund a new computerised reporting service via the LGF Helpline.

2003 has also been an extremely productive year for our partnership with Manchester Public Health Development Service (MPHOS). We have collaborated to produce two new resources 'Knowing the Score' (Drugs and Alcohol) and Sort it Out (for young LGB people). In September a project to support male escort and sex workers was launched. Without a doubt the partnerships greatest success last year was the launch of the Hepatitis B clinic at Unity House; with a 67% return rate and over 100 users in a six month period. This success has enabled MPHDS, Manchester Royal Infirmary and the LGF to launch a full GUM screening service for the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual community.

With Manchester and Salford Drug Action Teams we launched the North West's first major project to look at alcohol and drug use amongst LGB people. Work included research involving over 950 participants; making this the largest LGB drug and alcohol survey in the UK. We also started reciprocal training partnerships with local drug agencies.

In August 2003 Manchester played host to the largest EuroPride Festival to date. Our contribution, as a major delivery partner, included; providing design and production of many resources including the official listings guide. We distributed over 93,010 resources, including 62,240 safer sex packs. And co-ordinated the information point for the event – providing over 70 volunteers over the 10 day festival.

Continuing to build on our core provision

The Launch of outnorthwest in July and its distribution to over 700 sites throughout Blackpool, Liverpool, Cumbria, Cheshire and Lancashire and of course Greater Manchester - significantly contributed to the growth of the LGF's reputation as a regional agency.

2003 saw LGF return to Outreach work with a passion: We provided safer sex advice to 213 people within saunas and public sex environments. You gave your time to complete Community Talk Back questionnaires throughout the Village and into Stockport; on topics such as Condom use, Lesbians and sex and Hepatitis B.

Despite a continued lack of investment we raised (through payments) $\pm 4,332$ towards the $\pm 60,000$ s worth of free counselling we actually delivered.

From coming out to anxiety issues through to bereavement and relationship problems - our face to face counsellors helped people address all aspects of their lives.

The Top five issues the Helpline team helped you address in 2003-4, were:

- 1. Meeting others
- 2. Relationship problems
- 3. Overcoming loneliness and isolation
- 4. Sexual Health and HIV
- Information on community services and social venues

Last year we made a commitment to meet the needs of women, and older and younger people. In 2003-4:

We recruited 25% more women volunteers to the Helpline.

We received 19% of our Helpline calls from under 25 whilst 16% of our callers were over 44. We led the regions first health promotion work; specifically targeting lesbians and bisexual women by delivering health awareness campaigns around breast cancer and screening and Bacterial Vaginosis.

We worked with Manchester Public Health Promotion Service to Produce Sort it OUT – a guide for young LGB people.

We delivered Sexuality awareness sessions to 230 pupils at Levenshulme High School.

We further developed our groups for older gay men and older lesbians.

We conducted the UK's largest ever women's sex survey with over 970 respondents.

We produced safer sex packs for Lesbians and piloted free lubricant for Lesbians in Village Venues – which was such a success it's likely to become permanent next year.

Operation Fundraiser

Following on from the successes of Mardi Gras and World Aids Day in 2002, The Lesbian and Gay Foundation and George House Trust decided to pool their fundraising activities into an exciting joint venture – Operation Fundraiser. In August 2003, Manchester played host to EuroPride – Europe's LGBT Pride Festival and Operation Fundraiser oversaw the selling of the tickets for The Big Weekend'. A record £127,000 was raised for charity – the largest single amount ever raised over the Bank Holiday weekend. Operation Fundraiser followed this up with a fund raising event on World Aids Day in December 2003. The fundraising carries on all year round with bars, clubs, groups and individuals continuing to support us and raise lots of much needed funds. During 2003-4 Operation Fundraiser raised a grand total of £150,385. We would like to thank the venue managers, staff and customers and other donors who have helped us raise this vital money over the past year.

Monies from Operation Fundraiser are distributed to local LGBT and HIV Organisations through the Community Futures Fund. This has made a great impact on small and medium sized Organisations. In October 2003 the first £25,000 was distributed to LGBT groups and £37,500 was given to HIV Organisations.

Stepping Stones received £1,000 which enabled the group to continue.

Financial Review

The Lesbian & Gay Foundation can not exist without continuing financial investment from a range of funders, grant makers and donors. For every £1 provided through statutory sources, the LGF raises an additional £1.15 from other sources.

FINANCES AND REVIEW OF FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES

Overall the year resulted in a decrease in unrestricted funds to (income to spend on any activity appropriate to the LGF) £55,197 but with a corresponding decrease in the levels of restricted funds (income spent on specific activities specified by funders). The main source of income for the financial year 2003/04 was from Primary Care Trusts through Service Level Agreements. Income for some activities carried out in 2003/04 had been received in 2002/03. The LGF significantly increased income in a number of areas including Operation Fundraiser income (as a result of the massively successful Europride Festival where over £127k was raised for LGBT and HIV organisations); Drugs Action Team funding to inform Manchester City drugs workers of drugs useage by LGBT people; a successful bid to Heritage Lottery to provide a lesbian and gay archive at Unity House; continued funding from the Lord Chancellor's Department for Sustain relationship counselling; Softfire training income; magazine advertising from the relaunched outnorthwest (increased to over £60k from only £13k in 2002/03) and an increase in student placement income to the agency.

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed to project activity or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the LGF should be built up to between a minimum of 3 months and a maximum of 9 months running costs at any one time (as recommended by the Charities Commission). At this level the Board of Trustees believe they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop or change in the nature of funding. Given this situation it would be necessary to look at what funding is generated and the level of project activity carried out by the LGF and risk planning exercises have been carried out by the Board of Trustees. At the 31st March 2004 unrestricted reserves do not reach the minimum target level as no significant funding streams have been identified in 2003/04 to increase free reserves. The Board is aware of it's requirement to increase unrestricted reserves and continually looks at the financial position of the Charity.

Risk Management

The Trustee's have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that the systems are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks. A risk Assessment Register has been set up, and regular review sessions will take place, led by the Risk Manager.

Acquisitions and disposals of fixed assets during the year are recorded in the notes to the accounts.

Statement of Trustee Responsibilities in Relation to Financial Statements

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for the financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the incoming resources of the year and the application of resources of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue on that basis.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities, as well as exercising proper financial controls.

We have audited the financial statements of the Lesbian & Gay Foundation Limited for the year ended 31" March 2004 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the charity's members, as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's members those matters we are require to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described in the Statement of Director's Responsibilities the trustees, who are also the directors of the Lesbian & Gay Foundation for purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Trustees Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding directors' remuneration and transactions with the company is not disclosed.

We read the Trustees' Report and consider the implication for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

Basis of opinion

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Notes to the accounts 31 March 2004

1 Accounting Policies

- a) The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued October 2000.
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of cionations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received.
- c) Revenue grants are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.
- d) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.
- e) Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the charitable purposes.
- f) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.
- g) Staff costs and overhead expenses are allocated to activities either directly when identifiable or on the basis of staff time spent on those activities.
- b) Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life at the rates of:

Computer Equipment
Office Furniture & Fixtures

50% straight line basis 50% straight line basis

- The cost of generating funds includes any direct costs and staff time involved. A proportion of overhead costs is also included at a rate of 5% of the overall cost of accommodation and office expenditure.
- j) Management and administration costs of the charity relate to the direct costs of management including the costs of meetings, audit and statutory compliance and staff time involved in administration of the charity. A proportion of overhead costs is also included at a rate of 3% of the overall cost of accommodation and office expenditure.
- k) The company has taken advantage of the exemption under Financial Reporting Standard 1 from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.
- The company has not prepared consolidated accounts because its 2 subsidiary companies have not operated within the year and have no assets or liabilities.
- m) The Lesbian & Gay Foundation registered for VAT on 1 April 2002. The majority of the work the Foundation undertakes is outside the scope of VAT. Input tax is not normally recoverable on inputs relating to such supplies. However certain contracted-out services, training income and fees are eligible for recovery of VAT and the company recovers this quarterly in arrears. The remaining irrecoverable VAT is charged to the income and expenditure account in the year in which it is incurred.
- Operating leases
 Rentals due under operating leases are charged over the lease term on a straight line basis or on the basis of actual rentals payable where this fairly reflects usage.
 - Pensions
 The Lesbian & Gay Foundation operates a Stakeholder Pension scheme with Friends Provident. Employees are given the option of paying contributions to this scheme. The company makes employer contributions of 3% of gross salary to an approved personal or stakeholder pension scheme.
